

## The NADSP E-Badge Academy

The NADSP E-Badge Academy offers DSPs the ability to earn electronic badges as a way to demonstrate their knowledge, skills and values. The achievement of E-Badges can be applied to the requirements for DSPs to attain DSP-I, DSP-II, and DSP-III Certification. Each level of certification builds off of the requirements of the preceding level. As you'll see below, there are key differences between achieving NADSP Certification through The NADSP E-Badge Academy and the traditional, portfolio-based model of achieving NADSP Certification.

	The NADSP E-Badge Academy	Traditional NADSP Certification
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How is competency measured?	Applicants claim E-Badges by submitting a testimonial (or uploading required documentation).	Applicants submit portfolios containing work samples. Each work sample contains both a reflective statement and evidence.
How is competency evaluated?	Each E-Badge is reviewed as it is submitted.	Completed portfolios are reviewed in their entirety.
How long does the evaluation process take?	Each E-Badge is reviewed within three business days.	Each portfolio is reviewed within 90 days.
What feedback is provided to the applicant?	Feedback is provided only if the E-Badge is not awarded.	Significant feedback on all portfolios is provided by the review team.
What is the role of NADSP Accredited Education curricula?	Submitting documentation of NADSP Accredited Education allows DSPs to earn Accredited Education E-Badges. These are required to earn DSP-I and DSP-II certifications.	Applicants must submit documentation of Accredited Education hours as part of their portfolio.
How does an applicant get started in the program?	By claiming the Code of Ethics Commitment E-Badge.	By applying for NADSP-Registered (DSP-R) status.

How does an applicant earn DSP-I status?	<ul> <li>By earning 15 total E-Badges which must include:</li> <li>The Code of Ethics Commitment E-Badge</li> <li>The 50 hours of accredited education E-Badge</li> <li>At least one Core Competency E-Badge from the Crisis Prevention and Intervention competency area</li> <li>At least one Core Competency E-Badge from the Safety competency area</li> <li>At least one Core Competency E-Badge from the Person-Centered Practices competency area</li> <li>At least one Core Competency E-Badge from the Health and Wellness competency area</li> </ul>	By submitting <b>a portfolio containing four work</b> <b>samples</b> based on any four of the 15 NADSP Competency Areas for DSPs.
How many Accredited Education hours are required for DSP-I status?	<b>50 hours of direct instruction</b> from an NADSP Accredited Education program for DSPs.	<b>100 hours of direct and indirect instruction</b> from an NADSP Accredited Education program for DSPs.
How many skill statements are demonstrated before earning DSP-I status?	At least 10 skill statements have been demonstrated through core competency E-Badges.	At least <b>8 skill statements</b> are demonstrated through the portfolio work samples

DSP-II	The NADSP E-Badge Academy	Traditional NADSP Certification
How does an applicant earn DSP-II status?	<ul> <li>By earning 30 total E-Badges which must include:</li> <li>The DSP-I E-Badge</li> <li>The 100 hours of Accredited Education E-Badge</li> <li>At least one Core Competency E-Badge from the Evaluation and Observation competency area</li> <li>At least one Core Competency E-Badge from the Communication competency area</li> <li>At least one Core Competency E-Badge from the Professionalism and Ethics competency area</li> <li>At least one Core Competency E-Badge from the Professionalism and Ethics competency area</li> <li>At least one Core Competency E-Badge from the Community Inclusion and Networking competency area</li> </ul>	By submitting a second portfolio containing four additional work samples based on four different NADSP Competency Areas for DSPs.
How many Accredited Education hours are required for DSP-II status?	<b>100 hours of direct instruction</b> from an NADSP Accredited Education program for DSPs (50 hours of which was previously completed at the DSP-I level).	<b>200 hours of direct and indirect instruction</b> from an NADSP Accredited Education program for DSPs (100 hours of which was previously completed at the DSP-I level).
How many skill statements are demonstrated before earning DSP-II status?	At least 22 skill statements have been demonstrated through core competency E-Badges.	At least <b>16 skill statements</b> have been demonstrated through the portfolio work samples

DSP-III	The NADSP E-Badge Academy	Traditional NADSP Certification
How does an applicant earn DSP-III status?	<ul> <li>By earning 50 total E-Badges which must include:</li> <li>The DSP-II E-Badge</li> <li>At least one Core Competency E-Badge from the Empowerment and Advocacy competency area</li> <li>At least one Core Competency E-Badge from the Community Living Skills and Supports competency area</li> <li>At least one Core Competency E-Badge from the Education, Training, and Self-Development competency area</li> <li>At least one Core Competency E-Badge from the Cultural Competency area</li> </ul>	By choosing one of the five NADSP speciality areas and submitting a portfolio containing <b>three additional work samples</b> focused on that area.
How many Accredited Education hours are required for DSP-III status?	<b>100 hours of direct instruction</b> from an NADSP Accredited Education program for DSPs (No additional training hours beyond the DSP-II requirements.)	<b>200 hours of direct and indirect instruction</b> from an NADSP Accredited Education program for DSPs (previously completed at the DSP-I and DSP-II levels), plus an additional 40 hours of employer-approved training tied to the chosen speciality area.
How many skill statements are demonstrated before earning DSP-III status?	At least 40 skill statements have been demonstrated through core competency E-Badges.	At least <b>28 skill statements</b> have been demonstrated through the portfolio work samples
